Labor Market Employment and Wage Data for Occupations in the Arts for the Washington Metropolitan Area: 2011 through 2015

This Data Sheet presents the Labor Market Employment and Wage Data¹ for Occupations in the Arts for the Washington Metropolitan Area (see Appendix for specific areas included) from 2011 through 2015. Occupations in the Arts include, but are not limited to, various types of Designers, Artists, Editors, Musicians, and Photographers.

Data Notes

- Standard Occupational Classification (SOC): The OES estimates are based on the full Standard Occupational Classification (SOC) system, which is used by Federal statistical agencies to classify workers into occupational categories for the purpose of collecting, calculating, or disseminating data. All workers are classified into one of 840 detailed occupations according to their occupational definition. To facilitate classification, detailed occupations are combined to form 461 broad occupations, 97 minor groups, and 23 major groups. Detailed occupations in the SOC with similar job duties, and in some cases, skills, education, and/or training, are grouped together.
- Occupational Employment and Wage Estimates: These estimates are calculated from data collected in a national survey of employers. Data on occupational employment and wages are collected from employers of every size, in every state, in metropolitan and nonmetropolitan areas, in all industry sectors. These estimates are cross-industry estimates; each occupation's employment and wage estimates are calculated from data collected from employers in all industry sectors. Self-employed persons are not included in the survey or estimates.
- Location Quotient: The location quotient is the ratio of an occupation's share of employment in a given area to that occupation's share of employment in the U.S. as a whole. For example, an occupation that makes up 10 percent of employment in a specific metropolitan area compared with 2 percent of U.S. employment would have a location quotient of 5 for the area in question.

¹ These data come from two sources: The Bureau of Labor Statistics' (BLS) Occupational Employment Statistics (OES) Reports from 2011 to 2015 and Burning Glass' Labor Insight Database.

Occupational Employment Estimates (Table 1) are calculated from data collected in a national survey of employers. Data on occupational employment are collected from employers of every size, in every state, in metropolitan and nonmetropolitan areas, in all industry sectors. These estimates are cross-industry estimates; each occupation's employment estimates are calculated from data collected from employers in all industry sectors. Self-employed persons are not included in the survey or estimates.

The following job postings data (Table 2) comes from the Burning Glass software. Burning Glass collects millions of online job postings from close to 40,000 sources on a daily basis. Both Burning Glass and OES estimates are based on the Office of Management and Budget's revised metropolitan area definitions. These results are based on the 2010 decennial census.
