

Completion Rates of First-Time in College Students at NOVA by Enrollment Status: 2004-05 through 2008-09 Cohorts

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Introduction

This Report examines the completion rates of five cohorts of first-time in college (FTIC) NOVA students from 2004-05 through 2008-09 who completed within three to seven years of entry. Completion data includes students who either earned a degree at NOVA or who transferred out and completed at another institution in Virginia.

Although traditionally, community colleges are primarily concerned with three- and four-year completion rates, this Report extends the scope of analysis to seven years. Given that community colleges offer students a variety of enrollment options, such as full-time, part-time, and/or mixed enrollment status in order to serve a diverse student population, it is unsurprising that completion rates increase considerably when examined over this longer time period.


Section 1. Completion Rates of All FTIC Students at NOVA

National data from the National Student Clearinghouse indicates that 39 percent of students who entered community colleges in Fall 2008 graduated within six years (Shapiro and Dundar, 2014). SCHEV data for NOVA indicates that 37 percent of all FTIC students who entered NOVA in 2008-09 graduated from any institution within six years.

Overall Findings

Completion rates for all first-time in college (FTIC) students at NOVA increased steadily with each new cohort from 2004-05 through 2008-09 (Figure 1).² Over this time period, the seven-year completion rate increased by 13 percentage points, from 28 percent to 41 percent.

Completion Rates at NOVA vs. Transfer Institutions





Figure 3. Completion Rates at <u>Transfer-Out Institution</u> of <u>All</u> First-Time in College Students Entering NOVA in Fall and Spring: 2004-05 through 2008-09 Cohorts

The increase in completion rates is noticeably greater among students who completed at NOVA than for those who transferred-out and completed elsewhere in Virginia. Seven-year completion rates of students who completed at NOVA increased by 11 percentage points (from 16 percent to 27 percent), while those of students who transferred and completed elsewhere increased by 2 percentage points (from 12 percent to 14 percent) (Figures 2 and 3).

Section 2. Completion Rates by Enrollment Status


Measures to improve the completion rates of part-time students are particularly important in community colleges, as these students comprise the majority of community college students. In the United States, 59 percent of community college students enroll part-time (CCCSE, 2012). At NOVA in the cohorts presented here, the percentage of the student body enrolled part-time ranged from 64 to 67 percent.³

Overall Findings

Although completion rates increased over time for both full- and part-time students, the data reveal substantial differences in the completion rates of full-time versus part-time students. The disparity is not surprising given that part-time students, by definition, enroll in fewer credits.


Figure 4. <u>Total</u> Completion Rates of <u>Full-Time</u> First-Time in College Students Entering NOVA in Fall and Spring: 2004-05 through 2008-09 Cohorts

- The completion rate for FTIC students who began as full-time students steadily increased with each new cohort (Figure 4).
- The seven-year completion rate for full-time students increased by 16 percentage points, from 38 percent for the 2004-05 cohort to 54 percent for the 2008-09 cohort.
- In comparison, among part-time students, the seven-year completion rate increased to a lesser degree by 6 percentage points, from 17 percent to 23 percent (Figure 5).

Completion Rates at NOVA vs. Transfer Institutions

The percentage of full-time, FTIC students who completed degrees at NOVA within seven years increased by 13 percentage points, from 22 percent for the 2004-05 cohort to 35 percent for the 2008-09 cohort. In contrast, the seven-year completion rates of full-time, FTIC students who began at NOVA but transferred out to complete their degree increased by 3 percentage points, from 16 percent to 19 percent (Figure 6, next page).





Figure 7. Seven-Year Completion Rates of <u>Part-Time</u>, First-Time in College Students Entering NOVA: 2004-05 and 2008-09 Cohorts

Over the same time period, the percentage of part-time, FTIC students who completed their degrees at NOVA within seven years increased by 6 percentage points, from 10 to 16 percent. The seven-year rates of part-time students who transferred out to complete their degree decreased by about half a percentage point over the same time period (Figure 7, next page).

Conclusion

Although the completion rates of FTIC students at NOVA steadily increased over time, especially for FTIC students who entered as full-time students, more study may be needed on how to support part-time and transfer-out students.

Finally, additional data needs to be examined on average credit load to completion to determine whether the tendency of students who enter as full-time or part-time remains consistent and what the average credit load per semester is for degree completers.
