## Student Achievement Criteria at NOVA: <u>Transfer</u> by Select Student Characteristics

Northern Virginia Community College (NOVA) is deeply committed to the values of student access and student success. NOVA demonstrates this commitment by using evidence-based decision making to improve opportunities for students to succeed. After a long-standing history of evaluating outcomes related to retention, graduation, and other evolving priorities, NOVA refocused efforts in 2019 on a more comprehensive evaluation of eight critical measures of student achievement, which are as follows: 1) College Readiness; 2) Enrollment; 3) Course Success; 4) Retention; 5) Graduation; 6) Transfer; 7) Job Placement; and 8) Licensing Exams.<sup>1</sup>

### In This Brief

This Brief highlights NOVA's performance on the Transfer criteria. In addition to graduation, transferring is an important goal for many community college students. NOVA tracks two measures of transfer: the total number of annual transfers and the transfer-out rate of first-time in college, full-time, program placed students. College-wide data are presented for both measures of transfer. For the transfer-out rate measure, this Brief disaggregates data by select student characteristics. Disaggregation by these characteristics allows the college to identify where achievement gaps exist within its eight student achievement criteria.

#### **Key Findings**

- **Annual Number of Transfers:** From 2014-15 to 2018-19, the number of students who transferred from NOVA to a four-year institution increased by 32 percent, reaching 12,101 transfers to four-year institutions in 2018-19.
- **Transfer-Out Rate:** Among the Fall 2015 first-time in college, full-time, program placed cohort, the following student groups had transfer-out rates that were lower than their respective counterparts and the College overall: students who identified as Hispanic or Latino; male students; older students; students who received a Pell Grant; and students who were the first in their family to attend college.

#### **Section 1. Overall Transfer Trends**

#### **Annual Number of Transfers**

The annual number of transfers refers to the number of NOVA students who transferred to a fouryear institution in a given academic year, regardless of when they were last enrolled at NOVA. From the 2014-15 to 2018-19 academic years, the annual number of transfers increased by 32 percent (from 9,200 transfers in 2014-15 to 12,101 transfers in 2018-19).





Figure 1. Annual Number of Transfers to Four-Year Institutions: 2014-15 through 2019-20

### **Transfer-Out Rate**

The transfer-out rate is defined as the percentage of first-time in college, full-time, program placed (degree- or certificate-seeking) students who transferred out of NOVA to another two- or four-year institution within 150 percent of normal time to program completion. The transfer-out rate does not include students who earned a degree from NOVA prior to transferring. From the Fall 2012 to Fall 2015 first-time in college, full-time, program placed cohorts, the transfer-out rate remained the same at 16 percent.


#### Section 2. Transfer Rate by Select Student Characteristics

This section presents data regarding the transfer-out rate of first-time in college, full-time, program placed students at NOVA. The transfer-out rate is defined as the percentage of first-time in college, full-time, program placed (degree- or certificate-seeking) students who transferred out of NOVA to another two- or four-year institution within 150 percent of normal time to program completion. The transfer-out rate does not include students who earned a degree from NOVA prior to transferring. In this section, transfer-out rates are disaggregated by the following student characteristics: race/ethnicity, gender, age group, Pell Grant status, and first generation status.

#### **Transfer-Out Rate by Race/Ethnicity**

Among the Fall 2015 cohort of first-time in college, full-time, program placed students, students who identified as Hispanic/Latino had the lowest transfer-out rate (9 percent), which was 7 percentage points below the College-wide transfer-out rate. Additionally, the transfer-out rate Hispanic/Latino students was between 7 and 11 percentage points lower than all other race/ethnic groups.


Conversely, the other four racial/ethnic groups either met or exceeded the College-wide transferout rate of 16 percent. Students who identified as white had the highest transfer-out rate (20 percent), followed by students who identified as another race or ethnicity (17 percent), and Black/African American students and Asians students (16 percent each).

### **Transfer-Out Rate by Gender**


Among the Fall 2015 cohort of first-time in college, full-time, program placed students, female students had a slightly higher transfer-out rate than male students (16 versus 15 percent). While the transfer-out rate for female students was the same as the College-wide average of 16 percent, the transfer-out rate of male students was one percentage point below the College.

### **Transfer-Out Rate by Age Group**

Among the Fall 2015 cohort of first-time in college, full-time, program placed students, students aged 21 and younger had a higher transfer-out rate than older students (16 percent versus 9 percent for students aged 22 to 29; and 7 percent for students aged 30 and older). The transfer-out rate for both older age groups was below the College-wide average of 16 percent, whereas the transfer-out rate for students aged 21 and younger was the same as the College.

### **Transfer-Out Rate by Pell Grant Status**

Among the Fall 2015 cohort of first-time in college, full-time, program placed students, students who did not receive a Pell Grant had a higher transfer-out rate than Pell Grant recipients (17 versus 13 percent). While the transfer-out rate for non-Pell Grant recipients was above the College-wide average of 16 percent, the transfer-out rate of Pell Grant recipients was three percentage points below the College-wide average.




Figure 6. Transfer-Out Rate by Pell Grant Status: Fall 2012 through Fall 2015 First-Time in College, Full-Time Program Placed Cohorts

#### **Transfer-Out Rate by First Generation Status**

Among the Fall 2015 cohort of first-time in college, full-time, program placed students, continuing generation students had a higher transfer-out rate than first generation students (17 versus 12 percent). While the transfer-out rate for continuing generation students was above the College-wide average of 16 percent, the transfer-out rate of first generation students was four percentage points below the College-wide average.




Figure 7. Transfer-Out Rate by First Generation Status: Fall 2012 through Fall 2015 First-Time in College, Full-Time Program Placed Cohorts
