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Fall-to-Spring Retention Rates for All Students and First-time to College Students: Fall 2011 through Spring 2014

This Research Brief presents Fall-to-Spring retention rates from Fall 2011 through Spring 2014 for all students and for first-time to college students. For the purposes of this Brief, "first-time to college students" are students attending college for the first time who were enrolled in a fall semester. The Fall-to-Spring retention rate is the percentage of this cohort who returned in the following spring semester. "All students" include returning, transfer, and first-time to college students who were enrolled in a fall semester. The Fall-to-Spring retention rate is the percentage of these students who returned in the following spring semester. Retention rates for each of these two categories of students are provided for the College overall and for each campus*.




Figure 1. College-wide Fall-to-Spring Retention Rates for All Students: Fall 2011 through Spring 2014

Figure 1 presents College-wide Fall-to-Spring retention rates for all students from Fall 2011 through Spring 2014. As shown below, Fall-to-Spring retention rates for all students decreased from 70 to 68 percent from Spring 2012 to Spring 2013, and remained at 68 percent from Spring 2013 to Spring 2014.


* Medical Education Campus (MEC) data include all students who indicated MEC as their home campus even if they are not placed in nursing or allied health programs.





Figure 2b. Fall-to-Spring Retention Rates for All Students by Campus

Table 1 and Figures 2a and 2b (see next page for Figure 2b) show Fall-to-Spring retention rates for all students from Fall 2011 through Spring 2014 by campus. As shown in the table and figure, the Fall-to-Spring retention rates for all students decreased at each campus during the time period from Fall 2011 through Spring 2014.

Figure 3 depicts College-wide Fall-to-Spring retention rates for first-time to college students from Fall 2011 through Spring 2014. As seen below, the Fall-to-Spring retention rate for firsttime to college students decreased from 80 percent to 78 percent during this time period.





The Fall-to-Spring retention rates for first-time to college students decreased overall for each campus during this time period.



Fall 2011 through Spring 2014






Figure 4b. Fall-to-Spring Retention Rates for First-time to College Students by Campus (Manassas, Medical Education, and Woodbridge): Fall 2011 through Spring 2014

Summary of Results

- In a comparison of retention rates of first-time to college students with all students, those attending college for the first time had higher Fall-to-Spring retention rates than all students from Fall 2011 through Spring 2014.
- College-wide, Fall-to-Spring retention rates for first-time to college students decreased from Spring 2012 (80 percent) to Spring 2013 (78 percent), but remained the same from Spring 2013 to Spring 2014 (78 percent each).
- Similarly, Fall-to-Spring retention rates for all students, College-wide, decreased from Spring 2012 (70 percent) to Spring 2013 (68 percent), but remained the same from Spring 2013 to Spring 2014 (68 percent each).
- Among the campuses, during the period from Fall 2011 through Spring 2014, Fall-to-Spring retention rates for first-time to college students were highest at the Annandale Campus (81 to 83 percent). During the same time period, Fall-to-Spring retention rates for all students were highest at the Medical Education Campus (71 to 73 percent).
