

College Success Skills (SDV 100) is a student success course at NOVA that provides students with knowledge and skills related to time-management, studying, and decision-making, as well as information about NOVA policies and resources. This Research Brief presents the average cumulative grade point average (GPA) and the Fall-to-Spring retention rates of first-time to NOVA students who enrolled in SDV 100 during Fall 2013. These student success outcomes were compared to those of all other first-time students enrolled in Fall 2013. In addition, data for each group are disaggregated by student demographic characteristics (gender and race/ethnicity).

Overall results suggest that students who enrolled in SDV 100 in Fall 2013 earned a higher average cumulative GPA and were retained at higher rates compared to all other first-time students.

Table 1 compares the average cumulative GPA of students enrolled in SDV 100 in Fall 2013 with the average cumulative GPA of all other first-time students. The average cumulative GPA of students enrolled in SDV 100 was higher (2.23) than that of the comparison group (1.94).

Table 2 presents the average cumulative GPA of students enrolled in SDV 100 and all other first-time students by gender. The average cumulative GPA for male and female students enrolled in SDV 100 was higher than that of their counterparts (males: 2.09 vs. 1.83; females: 2.38 vs. 2.05) in Fall 2013.

Table 3 (see next page) displays the average cumulative GPA of students enrolled in SDV 100 and all other first-time students by race/ethnicity. In Fall 2013, the average cumulative GPA of students within each of the racial/ethnic groups who enrolled in SDV 100 was higher than that of their counterparts.

Table 4 presents the Fall-to-Spring retention rates of students enrolled in SDV 100 and all other firsttime students. Students who enrolled in SDV 100 during Fall 2013 returned to NOVA at a higher rate in Spring 2014 (83%) compared to all other first-time students (65%).

Table 5 shows the Fall-to-Spring retention rates by gender for students enrolled in SDV 100 and all other first-time students. Both males and females who enrolled in SDV 100 returned to the College at higher rates than all other first-time students (males: 82% vs. 65%; females: 84% vs. 66%).

Table 6 displays the Fall-to-Spring retention rates by race/ethnicity for students enrolled in SDV 100 and all other first-time students. Students within each of the racial/ethnic groups who enrolled in SDV 100 in Fall 2013 returned to NOVA the following semester at higher rates than their counterparts.
