

This Research Brief shows the four-year graduation rates of first-time to NOVA, program-placed students by enrollment status (either full-time or part-time) and demographics. Data for four cohorts, Fall 2006 through Fall 2009, are included.

Overall results show that the graduation rate of full-time students was consistently higher than that of part-time students. When broken down by gender, female students graduated from NOVA within four years at higher rates than male students regardless of full-time or part-time status. Younger students (ages 24 and under) tended to have higher graduation rates compared to older students (ages 45 and older). Among racial/ethnic groups, Asian and Other students showed the highest graduation rates, while Black and Native American students had the lowest rates, regardless of full-time or part-time status.

Table 1 (below) and Figure 1 (next page) display four-year graduation rates of first-time to NOVA, program-placed students by full-time and part-time status. Across all cohorts, full-time students graduated within four years at higher rates (21 to 28 percent) when compared to cohort of part-time students (9 to 12 percent). The overall four-year graduation rate for all first-time to NOVA, program-placed students increased steadily with each cohort, from 16 percent for the Fall 2006 cohort to 21 percent for the Fall 2009 cohort.




Table 2 shows the four-year graduation rates of full-time students by gender. Among full-time students, female students had higher graduation rates (25 to 33 percent) compared to male students (17 to 24 percent) in each cohort.

Table 3 presents the four-year graduation rates of part-time students by gender. Within each cohort, female students graduated at higher rates (11 to 13 percent), than male students (7 to 11 percent).

Table 4 presents the four-year graduation rates of full-time students by age. Generally, younger students showed the highest graduation rates among the age groups. For the Fall 2006 and Fall 2008 cohorts, full-time students under 18 had the highest graduation rates (30 and 34 percent, respectively). For the Fall 2007 cohort, students ages 22 to 24 had the highest rate at 27 percent, and for the Fall 2009 cohort, students ages 18 to 21 had the highest rate at 29 percent. Students ages 45 and over had the lowest graduation rates in three of the four cohorts, and the lowest overall graduation rate for full-time students (nine percent) in the Fall 2007 cohort.

Table 5 displays the four-year graduation rates of part-time students by age. Part-time students ages 25 to 29 had the highest graduation rates of any age group in the Fall 2006 and Fall 2009 cohorts (11 and 15 percent, respectively). Students under 18 had the lowest graduation rate of any age group in the Fall 2006 cohort at seven percent, but the highest in the Fall 2007 cohort, at 23 percent.

Table 6 shows the four-year graduation rates for full-time students by race/ethnicity. Asian students showed the highest graduation rates (ranging from 27 to 34 percent) in three of the four cohorts. Among all racial/ethnic groups, Black students showed the lowest graduation rates in the Fall 2006 and Fall 2009 cohorts (15 and 18 percent, respectively). Native American students showed the lowest graduation rates in the Fall 2007 and Fall 2008 cohorts (6 and 19 percent, respectively).

 Students by Race/Ethnicity: Fall 2006 through Fall 2009 Cohorts

Table 7 presents the four-year graduation rates for part-time students by race/ethnicity. As with full-time students, Asian students had the highest graduation rates (13 to 15 percent) in three of the four cohorts. Among all racial/ethnic groups, Native American students had the lowest graduation rates (ranging from 0 to 8 percent) in all but the Fall 2007 cohort, where Black students had the lowest graduation rate (7 percent).
