Introduction

This Report presents transfer data from the State Council of Higher Education for Virginia (SCHEV). The number of NOVA transfer students at Virginia public four-year institutions is presented by sub-cohort. Data in this report were retrieved from SCHEV on July 3, 2014.

NOVA Transfer Students at Virginia Public Four-Year Institutions by Sub-Cohort

Table 1 presents data on all NOVA students transferring to Virginia public four-year institutions in the Fall and Spring of 2005-06 through 2012-13. The number of NOVA transfer students at Virginia public four-year institutions increased by 1,820 students from 2005-06 (2,448) to 2012-13 (4,268).

Mission
