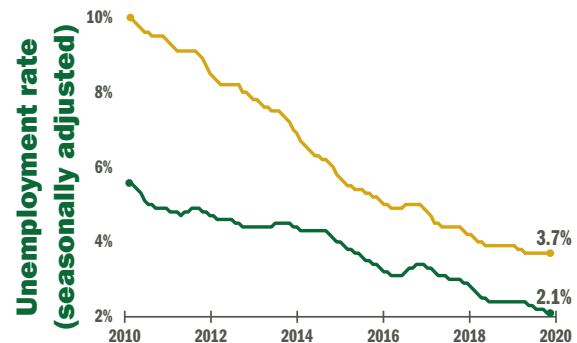

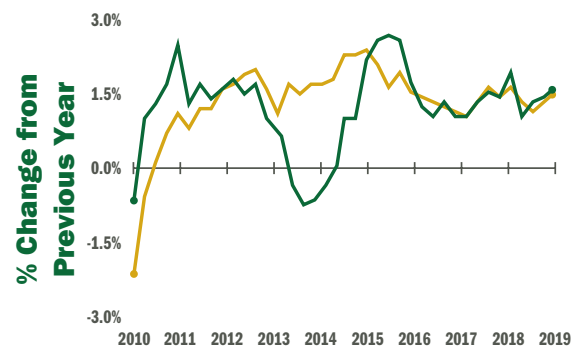
The unemployment rate decreased 60% over the decade.

Unemployment continued to drop during the economic recovery—the **northern VA** rate remains around half that of the **United States**, on average.



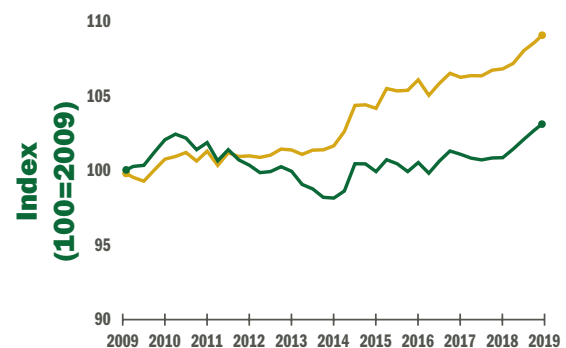
Regional employment growth is closely linked to the federal government.

Employment growth in **northern VA** was similar to the **United States**—except during the federal debt crisis and sequestration (2012-2013) when it slowed significantly.



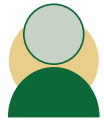
Average annual wages are growing slower than the national average.

Average annual wages* stayed relatively flat in **northern VA** despite rising slightly across the **United States**. However, average wages for the region remain much higher than the national average.

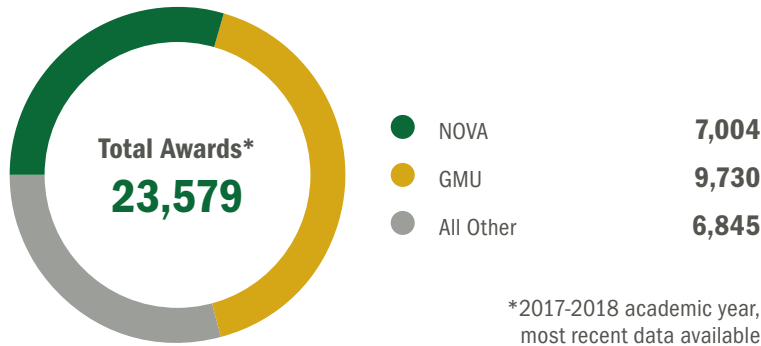

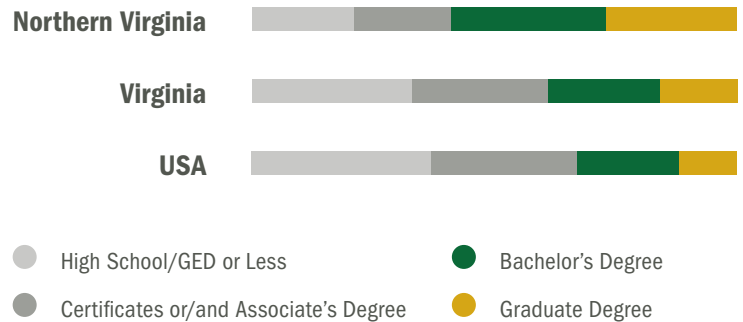
Postsecondary Awards

NOVA and George Mason University (GMU) accounted for the majority (71%) of all postsecondary awards in northern Virginia.



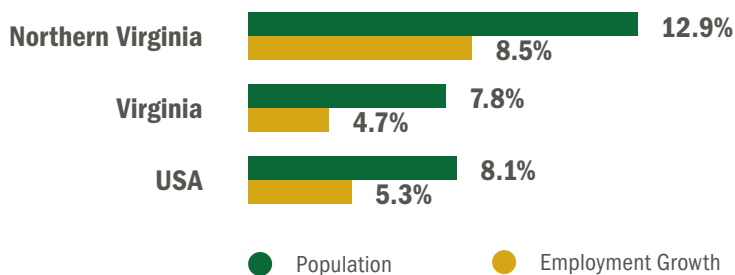
Levels of Education
