NOVA COLLEGE-WIDE COURSE CONTENT SUMMARY HIS 251- HISTORY OF MIDDLE EAST CIVILIZATION I (3 CR.)

Course Description

Surveys intellectual, cultural, social, economic, and religious patterns in the civilizations of the Middle East. Covers Semitic, Indo-European, and Turkic-speaking peoples from pre-Islamic to the present. HIS 251 begins in pre-Islamic Arabia and concludes with the decline of the Ottomans. Lecture 3 hours a week.

General Course Purpose

Investigates social, political, religious and cultural institutions of the Middle Eastern states past and present. Designed to provide a wide range of course experiences to meet the needs of the NOVA student population.

- a) Provide students with an understanding of Middle Eastern social, cultural, economic, political, and religious institutions.
