NOVA COLLEGE-WIDE COURSE CONTENT SUMMARY HIS 252 – HISTORY OF MIDDLE EAST CIVILIZATION II (3 CR.)

Course Description

Surveys intellectual, cultural, social, economic and religious patterns in the civilizations of the Middle East. Covers Semitic, Indo-European, and Turkic-speaking peoples from pre-Islamic to the present. Part II of II. Lecture 3 hours per week.

General Course Purpose

Investigates social, political, religious and cultural institutions of the Middle Eastern states past and present. Designed to provide a wide range of course experiences to meet the needs of the NOVA student population.

Upon completing the course, the student will be able to:
